

ODOT VRS System Update

Use of the ODOT VRS system can eliminate the need for expensive and security problem base station setups similar to the one shown below.



The ODOT Virtual Reference Station (VRS) system very soon is moving to a yearly fee system.

This VRS system allows users with a single GPS rover unit, data capable mobile phone (including data plan) to perform surveying without a base station equipment setup. The VRS provides the user with GPS data from its nearest CORS (continually operation reference station) as its way to provide position to just a single GPS rover. ODOT has 52 CORS's throughout Ohio.


ODOT has been providing their VRS at no charge to users who request access for the past few years; however, within the next month or two the yearly access fee will be \$500 per license/unit.

At your next local chapter meeting, ask around and you'll probably find colleagues that are using ODOT's VRS system or know of companies that do.

Let's continue with the words of Joshua Varney from 1911:

"Plumb-bobs were used on uneven ground, but it was necessary to support the pole in the middle, or the sag would vitiate the measurements. Much may be said in favor of poles for accurate measurements, one strong point in their favor being that the effects of temperature and moisture on their length are negligible quantities. Those subdivisions, which were made with poles, generally show accurate work. If tapes had not been introduced, the changes in transportation would have forced a change. Until later than 1890, we kept horses and vehicles to transport our tools. Trolley cars now reach nearly all parts of the county, but they have no place for 20-foot poles, and there have been threats to exclude our line rods.

The records of the work done by Ahaz Merchant and his son. Aaron, seem to justify especial notice of them among the early surveyors. Neither of them lived to what may be called old age'; Ahaz.'68 years. (1794 to 1862); Aaron, 58 years, (1817 to 1875).

Our Recorder's office shows a very large percentage of the recorded surveys previous to 1875, signed either by Ahaz or Aaron Merchant, and we know that a large part of their work was performed among forest trees on land, now covered with paved streets, and brick, stone and frame buildings. We find their work is of a high order, and the surveyors of today recognize this fact. Evidence that they had the confidence of the people is found in the fact that during the 65 years from the organization of the county in 1810, to 1875. the father and son held the office of County Surveyor 30 years. A list of the incumbents will show this and will be of interest here.

Until 1832, they were appointed by Court and the incumbents were:

Between 1860 and 1870, the population of Cleveland increased from 43,000 to 93,000. Real estate values rose correspondingly, and it is no discredit to the Merchants to say that the time had come for a higher grade of work. Mr. Ackley realized this, and with the same tools, he had commenced to do a higher grade of work and was demanding it from those in his employ.

Well do I remember the first description in a deed in which I noticed seconds were used in giving the bearings of lines; it was made by an employee of Mr. Ackley. Since then I have made some effort to keep up with the procession, but at that time I thought it was an assumption of accuracy, which was not attained in fact.

Exactitude is not attainable. An error of 1/100 of a foot may express itself in a value of from less than one cent, to more than \$20.00. Land values are rapidly rising in this City. If a skyscraper is to be built, it is important that all the land shall be utilized; it is more important that it shall not become an encroachment. Habits are so easily formed that it is dangerous to do anything but the best we can, where property rights are affected. Knowing, however, that exactitude is not attainable, we may discuss the question as to how large an error may be ignored. By what rule shall we determine this? When we are making original surveys, that is, surveys by which property is to be conveyed, if we do our duty, we will leave monuments to govern the distances, and law-suits are not likely to grow out of our work. In such surveys we may, with propriety, compare the value of the land affected, with the value of the time required to reduce an error, but when we are locating land previously conveyed, law-suits are liable to result, in which case the value of the land is but a small factor in the problem.

(At this point, Varney compared several measurements made by different surveyors along some of the Cleveland streets. These have not been copied here.)

There is some uncertainty in No. 1, because the stones to which Walter measured were set after the Merchant survey. Merchant used a chain; Walter used a tape. In No. 3, Varney used a stone at the east end, set by Merchant, and a stone, set by Hartnell, at the west end. Merchant used poles. In No. 8, the monuments used by the others were set after the Pease survey. Pease probably used a Gunter's chain. The others used tapes.

Between 1872 and 1880, steel tapes came into use, making better work possible, and their usefulness was greatly increased by Mr. Clarence H. Burgess, who made a careful and thorough study of the effects of strain and temperature, and was the first among us to procure from the United States Coast

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

and Geodetic Survey Department, tests of tapes, 100 feet long, in place of the tedious and necessarily inaccurate method of comparing with the standard yard in the custody of our County Auditor. It is quite probable that if Mr. Burgess had not been among us, we would have learned to do this, but-but-it is also probable that some other person would have learned what lightning is if Franklin had not gone kiting. It is, of course, true that strain and temperature apply to chains as well as tapes, but their other inaccuracies are so great that to have considered these would have been an absurdity.

There were others who contributed to this improvement: one was, Chas. A. Walter, the assistant, who had charge of Street Surveys under Chas. H. Strong until Walter's death in 1887. He strove to set a good example in accurate work, and more than this, during his official life, the power was placed in his hands to enforce better work in making subdivisions. See Rev. S. of Ohio, Sec. 2601, and Rev. Ordinances of City of Cleveland, 1890, Sec. 1076, page 363. Previous to these enactments there had been some vague requirements as to what a subdivision map should show, but there was no tribunal to determine whether they conformed with the requirements. There are maps on record, made by land owners without the work of a surveyor; to this I do not object, but that is another matter. Under these State and City laws, the City Engineer was upheld in demanding better work, and the standard of work in general was raised."

More from Mr. Varney in future issues. The paper this came from also included some very interesting discussion by some of Varney's peers, some of whom took issue with some of Varney's statements. This will also be some interesting reading.

Marty is the GIS Manger for the Lorain County Auditor's office.



March CPD Seminar Review

Our own notorious and very extinguished John Dailey, P.S. presented one of his professional seminars to 26 of our members on March 5^{th} entitled "Due Diligence from the Surveyor's Perspective." Now semi-retired, John lectures on the continuing education circuit at much more expensive seminars (such a deal! for PLSO members who earned $1\frac{1}{2}$ PDH's).

Since so many experienced and eminent surveyors were present in the audience, the subject quickly shifted to a lively discussion of:

Easements – Visual indications such as pipeline markers, manholes, overhead wires, etc. should not be overlooked. Party chiefs should actually walk the property lines, and keep their eyes open.



What is the standard of practice in regard to showing all easements on every boundary survey? Each attendee seemed to be operating under differing standards, and various opinions were voiced.

Take the opportunity to "teach" or to educate attorneys and title company reps as the opportunities arise – This is good for the profession.

ALTA Table "A" Items are optional because there should be an additional fee for each additional item. John recommended that they be priced according to their value to the client (not necessarily per hourly rates).

Certifications – <u>Do not</u> certify any non-ALTA language, and especially do not certify anything outside the realm of professional surveying (e.g. Wetlands, hazardous waste, soil, etc.).

All those present appreciated John's retrospectives, interesting anecdotes and professional insights.

Things I Wonder About.... Boundary Surveys & Easements

I think I'm finally old enough to realize the questions I have are what a number of other surveyors have as well. I'm not nearly as embarrassed as I used to be to ask about things of which I have little knowledge. It's not that I'm proud of my ignorance, it's just that I simply want to know a bit more. I hope you do too.

At our last Cleveland Chapter CPD Dinner Meeting/ Seminar in early March, John Dailey gave a thoughtful presentation on due diligence during the course of surveys. John showed several examples, including ALTA/ACSM Land Title Surveys, Boundaries, and Mortgage Location Surveys. With the first example being ALTAs, my mind began to wonder. I guess the presentation, being immediately after dinner, was "food for thought". ;-) OK, all groans aside, those of you that were able to make it to the session heard me ask, as much to the audience as to John, "What do you include on your boundary survey maps with regard to easements?"

I re-visit that question here. For a typical lot survey:

Do you typically show the standard front/side/rear utility easement(s) as depicted on a subdivision plat when you do a lot survey?

Do you include easements not recorded with the deed, such as those found in a title report?

Do you include any "CYA" disclaimer statements with regard to title report items being shown?

Example: Say you have the following situation – 50 year old subdivision, ditch along sidelines of Sublots A & B with 10' easement, 40 years ago City decides to enclose

ditch with box culvert, obtains easement of additional 15 feet on each side, and has easements recorded for both sublots. You are hired to do a boundary survey of Lot A for a recent purchaser. Are you obligated as a Professional Surveyor to find and show this additional 15' easement? What if you do not, and said purchaser makes landscaping and/or fencing improvements in the easement area? Hmmmm.....

For what are we liable - for not showing?

At the dinner meeting/seminar, it was interesting to hear the responses in the room. Sorry if you missed it.

What did I learn? It's time to read 4733-37 again, time to look at my disclaimer statements, and, once again, time to revisit my standard contracts.

Boundary surveys and easements... just one of the things I wonder about.

2011 PLSO Annual Conference Hosted by the Cleveland Chapter Wednesday, February 9th through Saturday, February 12th, 2011

Planning is already under way for the next conference in Cleveland. Because of the size of the annual conference the locations have become limited to three of the larger Ohio cities. Columbus, Cincinnati and Cleveland. Our Chapter has good reason to accept this responsibility on a three year rotation. The most important benefit is to our Chapter Members who can attend without the added expense of travel and hotel accommodations. No matter what the state of the economy, that's a bonus!

Also, the Cleveland Chapter is starting its own Scholarship Program and the conference profits are a source of funding. When the conference generates a profit in excess of \$6,000.00 the Chapter is guaranteed a \$3,000.00 share. Every three years that \$3,000.00 is earmarked for the Cleveland Chapter Scholarship Fund. Other earmarks include proceeds from seminars and data bank information. The fund was started in 2008 and as of the end of February contains \$3,417.37. You can make a donation directly by contacting our <u>Treasurer</u>.

The 2009 conference in Columbus is reporting a successful turnout of over 400 attendees. They fell short on the guaranteed hotel rooms but are predicting a profit. Two experiments were integrated into this conference. For the first time, the Conference Banquet was an optional event. This revealed a true indication of the level of interest this event holds for the attendees. 60 out of over 400 attended the banquet. Complete statistics for the 2009 conference are not available yet but in 2008 there were 14 banquet tickets paid by the conference. A reasonable determination then is that less than 14% of the conference attendees were interested in the banquet and willing to pay the additional \$70.00 ticket price. The other experiment was holding two auctions at an event Thursday evening in the exhibit hall. One benefited the Political Action Committee Fund (PAC) and the other to benefit the State PLSO Scholarship Fund. Both successfully generated about \$2,100.00 for each fund. The items auctioned ranged from antique instruments and rare books to vacation getaway packages. A great social event.

Presently the planning stage concerns hotel selection but quickly we'll move into the program, speakers, events, dates and time. Now is your opportunity to be asking questions and making suggestions.

How many CPD credits should we plan? Is Saturday necessary? Does the spouse program generate enough interest to keep?

What about 3 early-bird CPD credits Wednesday evening from 6-9:30 for special pre-registrants? Do we eliminate the banquet and find a different venue for the installation of officers and awards? Is there enough social time?

Are lunches and breaks too long?

Can we work with the Visitor's Bureau to provide incentives for attendees to stay the weekend and visit Cleveland's best attractions?

The half page advertiser I mentioned last month has decided to not run their ad in the *Cleveland Surveying News.* I hope they will come back when the economic situation improves. In the meantime, our distribution list continues to grow. I have also modified the postcard sent to members without email to be a mini meeting announcement with contact information instead of just stating the newsletter is available on our website.

Our executive committee approved the start of a new publication that will be sent to building departments of cities and villages in Cuyahoga County and select municipalities in Lorain County. The tentative name will be called "Cleveland Land Surveyor". The purpose of this publication is to make building department aware of professional surveyors and to help them understand the difference between different types of surveys. If building departments are more aware of the importance of knowing where property lines lie, the more likely they will be to

suggest, recommend, or require boundary surveys to be performed before issuing fence and building permits.

It's become clear that we professional surveyors need to do a better job promoting our profession in this ever changing technological environment we are in. GIS and GPS are two good examples of surveying technology misinterpreted in the hands of the non-surveying community and home owners. It is our responsibility to protect the public against harm. If we don't bring ourselves to the forefront, we will get passed by.

Chapter Historian Report

Somehow or another, while I was sitting around doing other things, an "opportunity" dropped into my lap that I could hardly ignore. The Chapter leadership put me in contact with William C. Barrow, the Special Collections Librarian at the Cleveland State University Library. Barrow is the man behind the "Cleveland Memories" project which is one of the best sites for Cleveland history. (Featured on Page 2 of CSN March 2008) He is trying to update the history of surveying in Cuyahoga County and in Northeast Ohio.

There is a small group currently working on Euclid Township, attempting to overlay some of the original 1797 and 1802 surveys on a GIS. I have spoken with Barrow about this and am still having a hard time picking up a useful thread.

Bill Barrow, Jack Hoy and I had lunch and discussed where he wants to go and how the Surveyors in the area could be of help. We discussed a first step, namely identifying who the early surveyors were, approximately when they were here and where they were working. At the last CPD meeting, I put out a request for anyone who could identify an old time surveyor to get the name and approximate time frame to me. This would serve as a basic data base on which to build. Having these names could lead to finding the actual surveys. How well the surveys will fit together is yet to be determined.

A good place to start would probably be the names of the surveyors who did the original internal subdivisions of the five mile square townships laid out by the Connecticut WR Land Company. On top of this we can start building a survey history. When you are looking over old survey records, look to see who did it and when. This includes plats, deeds or any other document.

The 4th and final part of my 4 part review of northeast Ohio county GIS's. I am finishing this project in March when I initially envisioned including reviews of all 6 area GIS's in the December 2008 CSN. Go figure.

LakeNavigator

Lake County

The Lake County GIS is governed by the GIS Board, County Engineer, County Auditor, and County Commissioner. Lake GIS logged 42 million hits in 2007. Their GIS was started in 1999 and was the first ArcIMS Internet GIS application in Ohio back in 2000. They update the tax map daily.

The start page of the Lake GIS is:






Tax/Parcel Map

The Lake GIS allows for view of a Parcel Map (parcel lines only) or the full tax map by turning additional



layers on. Click on the *Parcel Labels* folder in the layers palette shown at right to get the additional parcel text layer options. The mapping with parcel numbers, owners, and lot dimensions is shown



atop the next column. These parcel labels will not become visible until you are sufficiently zoomed in. There are also layers to show old parcel lines, lot lines, and tracts. All of which are very useful options for surveyors. Also text displayed on the mapping stays the same size no matter how far you zoom in.

Lauers

I have already discussed a portion of the layers the Lake GIS has available and they are displayed to the left of the mapping. The GIS offers layers for contours, streams, soils, and draft updated flood maps that are found under the *Elevations*, *Hydrography*, and *Environmental* layer folders respectively.

Geauga provides aerial photography dating back to 1973. Yes 1973, it's not a misprint. The resolution and edge matchup for the older aerials certainly isn't a good as photography flown since the year 2000, but it is still very useful. When you are doing land planning for the future, it's important to know how the land was in the past. The Lake GIS department plans to add aerial photography from 1951 very soon. They are also working on photography from 1967 and 1937; however, the completeness of county coverage is lacking and extra funding is necessary to bring it all to the GIS.

You will notice the Lake GIS has aerial photography layers for Ashtabula, Geauga, and Cuyahoga counties. This is for emergency management functions because Perry nuclear power plant is within Lake County. Cuyahoga's aerials and centerlines were hosted for the benefit of Cuyahoga's emergency management teams before Cuyahoga had their GIS operating.

Parcel/Map Selection

Parcels are graphically selected. Most

surveyors will use the P button shown at right to select a parcel. This brings up brief parcel information at the bottom left of the mapping with, but also links to extra

information shown at right.


RETRIEVE AUDITOR'S DATA SUBDIVISION PLAT ARCHIVED TAX MAP DOCUMENT LIST

Auditor's Data brings up tax information; Subdivision Plat brings up the full PDF pages of the subdivision the parcel is in (if it is a sublot); Archived Tax Map works the same way; and Document List brings up a list of recorded documents. The Lake County Recorder will not provide PDF versions of their newer scanned documents because of social security number issues as Lorain County did. Lorain County got past this problem so let's hope Lake County can too. Full and easy access to the subdivision plat and old tax maps are great to have as properties of the parcel you select.

Other parcel selection tools buttons are shown at right.



- Button 1: graphically select multiple parcels by clicking inside them.
- Button 2: window a rectangle and all parcels within the rectangle will be selected.
- Button 3: click each end of a line, with finish line/figure buttons at the bottom of the mapping



shown at right. All parcels the line cross will be selected.

Button 4: clear/erase graphic selections.

Tools

The Lake GIS provides tools for graphically measuring distances and areas. The distance tool shows you real-time distances as you move your mouse after each graphic point selection and you are always shown a running totals as you go along.

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

Three other tools that I haven't seen in the other 5 GIS's are shown at right and have these functions:



- Button 1: line or outline an area on the map in a specified color
- Button 2: label GIS data field (e.g. owner, road name, address) in adjustable sizes, fonts, etc.
- Button 3: state plan queries.

Downloads

The Lake GIS does not have any directly GIS related downloads available. They do sell GIS data on CDs for \$50.

The Lake County Tax Map Department has an archive of surveys, railroad valuation maps, and old atlases found here:

When in either *survey* selection, click on the option for *TIF* directory when confronted with the "To Parent Directory" screen.

The Lake County Engineer has a link for *Road Records* in his *Survey Data* page found here: www.lakecountyohio.org/engineer/Survey.htm
However the links on this page are not working at this time. I've searched their road records before and many of them are scanned field book pages of county surveys.

Monumentation

Click the box next to Control Points in the layers



list as shown at right to turn on Geodetic Monuments on the mapping. Then click on the words "Control Points". This will add the blue "i" making it your *Active Layer*. Next click the "i" button shown at right to allow you to graphically identify a feature. You can finally graphically select a geodetic monument marker and data for it will appear at the bottom of the screen. There will include a link to a PDF data sheet for it under the *Number* column. Some of the data sheets include a ground level photograph of the monument's surroundings and an aerial photograph.

<u>Printing</u>

This is where Lake GIS really shines and gives

users useful options. By clicking the printer icon/button at the top left of the screen, you are then given options to create a map at a specified scale, to include auditor's or recorder's information if a parcel is selected, and control over print size and orientation! You are able to create a print PDF in three sizes: letter, ledger (11x17), and 20x36 which they call *Tax Map* and in both portrait and landscape orientations! I can't tell you how good a feature this is to have when other GIS's only provide a user with a letter sized portrait print page.

In conclusion, it is obvious the longer a GIS has been around the more features it can offer. The Lake GIS excels at parcel label layers and print options. There is also very good access to county surveys and road records. This makes me wish I had more work to do in Lake County.

All 6 GIS reviews are now complete, so what have I learned? A considerable amount that's for sure. The newest GIS, Cuyahoga, has a bit of catching up to do to its older surrounding counties. I have high hopes for Cuyahoga's GIS to grow and add features and information.

It has been a very good experience to engage the GIS administrators from these 6 counties to show how we surveyors use a GIS and what is important to us. Starting next month I will have a place in the newsletter for GIS updates.
