


John Bischof congratulated Joseph O'Donnell on the accomplishments during the last year and presented him with the President's Plaque.



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FEBRUARY, 2007

Let's talk a little history. There have been a lot of stories written and movies made about the "winning of the West", all mainly located in the far western states. Very little has been written about the epic quarter century long frontier battle for what was known as the Ohio country.



With the end of the French and Indian War (the North American portion of the Seven Years War in Europe) in 1763, England gained control of the French held land in North America. The settlers along the eastern seaboard were facing a big problem, overcrowding. The area between the Atlantic Ocean and the Appalachian Mountains was quickly filling up, the soil was being depleted by farming (they did not know about crop rotation at that time) and land, if it was available, was very expensive. In order to keep peace with the Indians West of the mountains, the King ordered that there would be no expansion West of the ridge line of the Appalachian Mountains. Since most of the settlers in the Americas could not read very well, much of this order was ignored.

In "The Border Wars of the Upper Ohio Valley" author William Hintzen states "the Indians became alarmed at the wave of white settlers sweeping into their lands" and drew their "line in the sand" telling the settlers to come no further. That "line in the sand" was really the Ohio River. For the next 25 years, the Ohio country, that area North and West of the Ohio River became home to the bloodiest conflicts of America's western expansion.

There were Indian raids followed by settlers retaliation, bloody murders, kidnaping and torture by both sides. No quarter was asked for, given or expected by either side. A hunter going into the woods for game was himself the quarry. A favorite Indian tactic was to drive the game away from the settlements so that the hunting parties had to go further away from their protective settlements for game and became more vulnerable to attack. Surveyors were targeted by the Indians who felt that where these men went, settlements were quickly to follow.

Many women and children were kidnaped and taken to the Indian towns, where they were adopted into the tribe. Some escaped and made it back to the white settlements but many did not make it. The penalty for an attempted escape was torture and death. There is a story about Daniel Boone's daughter and two of her friends being captured by Indians and were being led north to captivity. The girls knew that their families would be following their trail trying to free them, so they left clues along the way for the search party to follow. They were eventually rescued and returned home. This tale became the basis of James Fenimore Cooper's fine novel "The Last of the Mohicans."

Relative peace did not come to the Ohio country until General "Mad" Anthony Wayne defeated the combined Indian forces at the Battle of Fallen Timbers, just North of the Maumee River in what is now the City of Maumee, Ohio in 1794. After that battle, the Indians were very divided. Should they continue the war or sue for peace? They finally accepted a peace offering from Wayne and met with him at Fort Greenville. This was the site of the worst military disaster in American history, the defeat of Governor St. Clair and his army. After much discussion, the Greenville Treaty Line was decided upon. The white settlers would stay south and east of the Treaty Line and the Indians would retain full rights north and west of it.

The peace held, for the most part, and the Ohio country flourished. There were still occasional skirmishes, but not to the degree of the previous 25 years. Surveyors could now ply their trade in relative security and were no longer hunted men carrying "that thing that steals our land", the surveyor's compass. New settlements sprang up, the Connecticut Western Reserve east of the Cuyahoga River was surveyed and settled, the United States Military District was established, surveyed and settled and the Virginia Military District was portioned out in greater amounts. The area of Southeast Ohio that came under the Public Land Survey System flourished.

Various purchases and treaties further diminished the Indian holdings in Ohio and the last of the Indian tribes left Ohio in about 1834. Ohio, for a long period of time, became one of the most prosperous and productive states in the Union. The West, as defined at the end of the Revolutionary War, had been won.

As a side note, General Anthony Wayne, besides being a farmer and a brilliant military officer was also a surveyor.

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

4.3 – PLSO Antique Instrument Statehouse Display - The PLSO has been considering displaying the PLSO antique survey instruments in the State House in Columbus. The State would be willing to do this however, it would require the PLSO to donate the instruments to the State. An option would be to loan the instruments to the Surveying Museum in Michigan, which is planning to relocate in Illinois. This would allow PLSO to maintain control of the instruments. No action is being taken at this time.

6.2 - Inter-Association Delegates - ODOT - ODOT is working with Dave Conner of NGS to develop a letter for consensus for Ohio to establish the standard unit of measurement as the US Survey foot. If established NGS will publish values for geodetic control in the State in both metric and the US Survey foot.

ODOT is also in the process of establishing standards for survey control using GPS.





- 7.2 Newsletter Editor Little input has been received for Issue #4. Request was made for Chapters and Members to get involved and write articles for the newsletter. Next deadline is April 1st.
