(see my Communication Report) You should have noticed that I re-designed page 2. I felt it had been too cramped and officer email addresses were difficult to read. Our newsletter continues to evolve.

President-Elect Michael Straub forwarded me this link to the California professional surveyors' organization's on-line newsletter:

They provide all their newsletters dating back to Volume 1 from 1967 to anyone who wants to read them, and not secluding it to its membership. As a profession we should be promoting ourselves and getting the word out about professional surveyors and the importance we provide. Does confining information about surveying in our state to only our membership serve the greater good of surveying?

I have heard it said that people join PLSO to receive the *Ohio Surveying News*. Last year only two issues of the *OSN* were published instead of the four issues that were in the budgeted, which is four issue less than the six *OSN* issues that used to be published only a handful of years ago. When very few issues come out, a lot of the content in it is so old it isn't *news* anymore. Heck, I might add a 9th *CSN* in December if I feel like it!

It's been almost two years since the "official" *OSN* editor has announced he would like to retire his position. Yet there has been no change because of budget and personnel uncertainties. In these two years only 5 *OSN* issues have been published when the goal was 9. Our members are overdue their benefits of membership especially with the \$40 dues increase last year.

I look forward to a new executive director being brought to the state office. There is a hope that this new hire would be able to also publish the *OSN*, however, I feel this new hire will have a lot of learning to do about our organization in the first few months. If you add on a 30+ page newsletter, that's a tall order. From the *PLSO Vision Committee's* report (see Page 21 of <u>CSN Sept 2008</u>):





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












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Communication Report



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

RANDOM LINES

I had the opportunity recently to find a copy of the March, 1911 "Journal of the Cleveland Engineering Society." In it, Joshua Varney, then a surveyor for the City of Cleveland, wrote an article about the surveying profession in Cleveland from 1872 until 1911.

I will quote Mr. Varney verbatim:

"My first work as a surveyor in Cleveland was in the spring of 1872, in the employ of Aaron Merchant, an ex-County Surveyor. I remained with him until his death in 1875, and with his son, Charles C. Merchant, until 1876. The following other persons were then living and were at that time or had been in the business: George E. Hartnell, George A. Hyde, Lucius Dean, John H. Sargent, Charles A. Walter, H. Haskins, J. C. Saxton, J. L. Sterling, J. R. Currier, John D. Crehore, W. H.Knapp I. Fulkerson, Chas. D. Bishop, Schuyler Oviatt and Stephen Forbes

"All surveyors were using Transits. Mr. Merchant owned, and occasionally used, an open sight Jacob Staff Compass, and although I used a transit. I followed his and my own previous practice and trusted to the needle in some cases. The open sight Jacob Staff Compass was useful when the country was new, and it probably still has a useful place. Better work can be done with it in woods than with a transit, unless more time is taken for the transit work. Thirty rods, or about 500 feet, is a long sight for lining with open sights on open ground in the most favorable light, but among trees, obstructions requiring offsets are lamentably frequent, and, though the statement may be disputed, offsets do not vitiate the alignment and their frequency tends to reduce errors, while errors in transit alignment are cumulative.

A Cleveland Surveyor, Mr. J. B. Davis, has invented and patented a Solar Transit, which appears to have advantages over others in the market, but the practice of Cleveland Surveyors indicates a belief that while the sun serves some very useful purposes, it is not so useful for preserving lines as stone monuments buried under, but near the surface of the ground.

For measurements of acreage property, Merchant and others used the Gunters Chain, which is 66 feet long and has 100 links, though I and some

others used a 100-foot chain. With 500 wearing surfaces and 200 small rings to become oblong, a chain is sure to increase in length, and, though we occasionally made tests and allowed for the excess, later careful measurements usually disclose a surplus over chain measurements.

For valuable city property and all subdivision work, two poles were used, each 20 feet long, with brass sockets at each end for protection. The foot marks were brass screws, and the 5-foot points were marked by the middle one of three screws. while inches were measured with a pocket rule.

One of our members, Mr. G. A. Hyde, tells me that while he was City Engineer, in 1856, he constructed a set of poles, and believes they were first used here about that time. At the present time. all principal measurements are made with steel ribbons, 100 feet or more in length. Some are graduated to feet only, in which case they are called "band chains" or "chain tapes." Some are graduated to 1/100 of a foot, in which case they are called steel tapes. The figures on the steel tapes require a wider ribbon and some of them are ½ inch wide, but nearly all are now using tapes 1/4 inch wide. I claim to have been the first surveyor in this City, and possibly in the United States, to use this width of tape. Becoming dissatisfied with the wider ribbon, I applied to the Chestermans in England, who sent me several samples of ribbon from which I selected this, and on my order they sent one which I am sure was the first ever used here. This was about the year 1886. I continued to purchase from the Chestermans until the Lufkin Rule Co. of Saginaw. Mich., commenced manufacturing them.

The evolution from Gunters chain and the poles, to steel tapes, has been through the forms of 100-foot chains, band chains and chain tapes, tapes divided into feet and inches, feet and inches on one side and links on the other, and finally to tapes, divided decimally, and records of work in our note books and in recorded deeds have followed a little behind the units used in the field.















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G. I.S. Review

Part 3 of my 4 part review of northeast Ohio county GIS's. As I mentioned Part 2 of my review, communication and interaction with governmental agencies is good for PLSO and professional surveyors. It's not a coincidence that Marty Rowe, Lorain County GIS Manager, has agreed to be a

speaker at our May CPD meeting after all the conversations and communication I had with him as I prepared the Lorain GIS review.

Geauga County

The *Access Geauga* GIS is a function of their county auditor and their county has about 52,000 tax parcels. Their Geauga County GIS received the 2006 IAAO Public Information Award.

The start page of the Geauga GIS is: www.auditor.co.geauga.oh.us/ag/ where you can enter the mapping page at the upper right corner by searching for a few different items. Or you can start with their overall county map.

Navigation

Similar to the previously reviewed GIS's, Geauga has a tool bar at the top of the map. The zoom and pan functions work as they do in the other GIS's


that have this type of tool bar. Your tool selection remain in



effect until you choose another tool. Their mapping does fully expand if you maximize your browser using a widescreen display. You can also input your map scale above the *Layers* and hit enter to show a desired scale.

<u>Tax/Parcel Map</u>

Geauga GIS allows for view of a Parcel Map with several different labels that can be displayed in each parcel. The pull-down list of *Parcel Labels* is found under *Layers* to the right of the mapping and is shown above right. Lot dimensions cannot be displayed nor does it show property lines that extend to the centerline of roads. Also text displayed on the mapping stays the same size no



your own survey drawings, that keeps with the scale of the map the further you zoom in.


Layers

Available layers are displayed to the right of the mapping, though this list will vary depending on the displayed scale of the mapping. i.e. the further you zoom in the more layer choices.

Geauga provides aerial photography dating back to 2000 which is a good reference for researching land use. They provide options for parcel lines better than any of the other 5 GIS's in this review.

Parcel layers are provided in 6 month increments dating back to 1998. This is a helpful tool to see when a lot was consolidated or split. Geauga also provides a *Parcel Lines Quality* layer that is a bold and commendable step on their behalf. Their

legend, shown on the continuation page, tells the source (if any) of the parcel lines. Shown at right are current parcel lines along with lines from just six months ago for part of Chester Township. "What's going on?" you might ask?

Line Definitions Parcel

Non-Surveyed (Scanned from Paper Maps) DROWN - (Digital Right-of-Way Network) (Base Lines, Prior to May 1996) Surveyed (May 1996 to Present) Surveyed (Prior to May 1996) Non-Deeded Condo Parcels

This really illustrates the accuracy of parcel lines in any GIS. What is happening here is the interconnected parcel lines are being *pushed* around when a new survey map, consolidation or split, is recorded. This shows how much error can be in parcel lines when overlaid onto aerial photographs. At work, we've already performed a sublot survey in a subdivision within Cuyahoga County because of Cuyahoga's GIS. The homeowner consulted their homeowner's association with a GIS print that showed his

Geauga County neighbor's flower bed being over the property line, when in fact the GIS showed the house built over the line too! The main problem there was nearby a right-of-way was drawn off by about 10 feet in width. And it turned out the flower bed, which was laid out off of a mortgage location survey, was barely clear of the property line.

> Geauga provides good layers such as tracts. sections, lots, and waterways/flood.

Parcel/Map Selection

Parcels are graphically selected, unlike the Cuyahoga GIS, by the yellow box of the toolbar shown at right. This is a very simple function without any other options.

Tools

The Geauga GIS provides tools for graphically measuring distances and areas. The distance tool is very good, as it shows you real-time distances as you move your mouse after each graphic point selection. If you click your right mouse button, the total distance measured is displayed.

Architects are using inches and sometimes ask us to use them on our maps. What the future may have in store for us we cannot know, but from the French metre, " Good Lord deliver us".

In using chains, the ends were marked with metal pins, which were also used as tallies. Effort was made to measure in horizontal planes, but plumbbobs were not used. Vertical lines were determined by the eye, or sometimes by dropping a pin or stone. It is only fair to say that Merchant, with the helpers he had educated, made much better measurements than I could make by such methods.

When I was about to commence using the poles, Mr. Merchant told me of a former employee who made accurate measurements rapidly. Let us assume that the ground is level. The forward end of the first pole is placed in line with the rear end at the zero or initial point of the line; it is most convenient to do this by resting on one knee. You then rise quickly and. with the second pole in hand, walk or run rapidly 20 feet, then kneel, place the forward end of the second pole in line, and draw

the rear end back by the side of the first pole. If you attempt to place the ends directly in contact, you are liable to move the first pole. You move the second pole forward until by an aside movement you can bring the ends in contact. When you have repeated this process fifty times in measuring 1,000 feet, you find it pleasant to sit on the sharp edge of a fence rail to figure up and learn how the measurements check. You can move rapidly and cause your blood to flow rapidly, but measuring rapidly and accurately is another proposition, whether you use poles, chains or tapes especially poles.

I have a precedent in the practice of one of the 1872 surveyors. It is said that a unit of measure, which he sometimes used, was the distance he had learned he could throw a stone of a given weight with a given amount of muscle."

There is also a *Scanned Map* tool (left tool shown next to distance and area on the previous page) that is used in conjunction with the *Scanned Maps* layer. Areas of scanned tax maps from the early 1990s will show on the mapping, though I could not get a scanned image to show up using this tool.

Downloads

Geauga County provides the files from their GIS for free download from this website here: www.auditor.co.geauga.oh.us/gis/downloads

This page says updates files were added this month. Some of these database files area rather large and are intended to be used in GIS or database software. I have imported the contour shape file for Chester Township and I had to dedicate a computer for about 6 hours of uninterrupted use in order to load the entire file into AutoCAD.

<u>Survey Monumentation</u>

There is a *GPS Coordinates* layer that displays symbol on the map, but without a way to access or display data about the monument.

Printing




The printer icon of the toolbar should be used for printing instead of your web browser's print function.

There are no options for print size or orientation.

In conclusion, Geauga County has a good performing fast GIS, providing useful tools and information especially about their parcel lines. They are also generous with providing their GIS files for anyone to download.
