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April 12th 2007 C.P.D. Seminar



Ann Miler of the Ohio Utility Protection Service started her session with the State of Ohio definition of an excavator: "Anyone who pierces the ground using a tool or machine." Yes, it's very broad and definitely includes surveyors. To follow the letter of the law, surveyors should call and obtain a ticket number for every single site they contract to survey. This may seem ridiculous but it's the law.

Here's an example situation: you contract a survey of a single lot in an older subdivision that may not have centerline control. In order to establish the city block in which that lot lies, you know that you will be looking for property corners on all four perimeter streets. All four streets need to be called in for utility markings three days before the start of the survey. It doesn't take much to cause a problem and open yourself up to liability. A bad nick in an old gas line

can cause a leak, which no one will notice until it migrates through the ground, into the nearest basement and builds up to an explosive level. BOOM. Game over, where's your insurance card?

Although that's a simplification, there are more rules. If you call in a site, you cannot start for three days but you must start within ten days. Also, if there is more than one contractor on a site, each must call and have a ticket number. Piggybacking on another ticket is not allowed. As soon as the markings fade, you have to call to have the ticket renewed.

Ground markings create a zone that includes 18" either side of the marking. For example, underground electric is marked with a dot centered between two lines about three feet apart. When you add the 18" either side, you actually have a 6' wide strip centered on the dot. The utilities contract for the marking service and restrict their contractors to marking only within the right-of-way.

Don't forget that Ohio is not a "one call" state. OUPS is only one of the services we need to contact for utility markings and they can only contact their own members.



DATA BANK =



Tim Feller is continuing work on new member welcoming materials.

Our TrigStar representative Bob Papotto is having a class at Trinity High School take this test.

John Dailey reported the Chapter Data Bank will be moved May 14th to the Cuyahoga County Archives. John will also supply the Chapter with a backup seminar program to use if a speaker does not show up for a seminar meeting. John also donated a digital projector to the Chapter.

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I recently attended the annual conference of the Ohio Genealogical Society in Columbus. One of the programs by Craig Scott was about the National Road in Ohio. We, of course, recognize that road as US 40. I do not have to go into detail about this road since everyone in the surveying profession knows about it. Right? Well, maybe some of the younger people (Interstate Highway age) may not know about it. Let me give a very brief history.

The National Road was the first major highway project on the new United States government. In the early years of our nation, there was discussion about the need of a good transportation system into the Northwest Territories, namely Ohio,



Kentucky and western Virginia. It was the intention of Congress and President Thomas Jefferson to create a road linking the Atlantic Ocean and the Ohio River. There had to be an easy way to transport troops and military goods across country in all weather as well as people, merchandise and trade goods. The Ohio River, although a major artery, had a tendency of freezing up or flooding. A decision was made to start this National Road at Cumberland, Maryland, at the confluence of two major rivers. This was also the starting point for the "Braddock Road" that was built during the French and Indian War during the ill fated attempt to capture the French Fort Duquesne (now Pittsburgh). Since some of the road was already there, it would be economically sensible to use it and expand it.

In 1819, J. Shriver, Surveyor, was instructed to survey the National Road from Cumberland, Maryland to Wheeling, Virginia, later West Virginia, which he did. He set out with a crew consisting of two chainmen, a marker, a "vaneman" and a horse. All of us old timers know what a "vaneman" is, right? Well, maybe not. I was asked by Craig Scott what that was and had to make my best guess that the "vaneman" was what we today would call a rodman. After returning from this conference, I searched all my old survey and reference books and could find nothing on a "vaneman." Until proven otherwise, I will stick to my definition.

Now, you have to understand what the conditions were 200 years ago. No transits, no EDM's and no data collectors. All the field notes were made by hand, in ink, and made using a quill pen.

Before quill pens, writing instruments dating back to the Romans, were hollow reeds. In the "Dark Ages", bird feathers came into use. Bird feathers may have been plentiful but this was not as easy as it sounds. First you had to catch a bird. Now, I have never been a farmer nor have I lived on a farm, but this does not sound like the easiest thing to do, especially if it happens to be a big goose with an attitude. I have a hard time imagining walking up to a goose, introducing yourself and pulling out a feather. Andrew Gardner, an author for Colonial Williamsburg, says that Thomas Jefferson bred special geese just for their quills. Being one of America's foremost writers, I can understand his need for a constant supply. A swan feather was much better, but who is going to challenge an angry swan for a feather?

After gathering the feather, however you got it, the point had to be hardened so that it could be sharpened. Gardner says that they would bury the feather in hot dry sand to harden them. After hardening, a pen knife (now you know where they got that name) was needed to make a sharp point. The finer the point the finer the writing.

A finely sharpened quill would last for about two pages of written text. Then you had to stop and resharpen the quill and start all over again. If you were lucky, a quill might last you about a week. Now, for keeping the field notes for a 130 mile long road, how many quills do you think Shriver went through?

I am old enough to remember using a metal nib and an ink well in grade school to learn how to write and I can remember how tough that was to write with. You usually ended up with as much ink on your fingers as you had on the paper. But you did learn how to write, which is quickly

becoming a lost art. With the advent of fountain pens, ball point pens, roller balls, keyboards, key pads, the stylus and now thumbs for test messaging, writing is becoming an interesting footnote to history.

So the next time you feel sorry for yourself for the amount of field notes you have to keep, think back to the surveyors of the past and think about how good you really have it.

The National Road was eventually extended across Ohio, Indiana and Illinois, ending for a time at Vandalia, Illinois, then the state capital. It was the first national interstate highway and a fascinating story. It is called the Road That Built America.





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
