



- 2.) Not all plans and surveys are prepared with the necessary care and precision for machine control—but a liability may exist regardless.

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
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Golf Outing



John Dailey reported the Data Bank is up and running and that the **City of Parma** Building Department is informing homeowners that mortgage location surveys are OK to use for build fences and other improvements.



Data Bank Discs

The larger survey drawings of the Chapter's Data Bank were scanned, in 1998 and 2004, before all the documents were donated to the Cuyahoga County Archives. (They are now County property and are not owned by the Chapter.)

1st Scan - Donation: \$100.00

Approximately 7,000 survey files in TIFF format on a CD.

2nd Scan - Donation \$25.00

Approximately 3,000 survey files in TIFF format on 1 DVD or 4 CDs (Please specify which disc medium when ordering.)

Both scans come with printed and bound index, provided by William J. Vondra, listing surveys by township then by original lot. All proceeds of these donations will go towards the scholarship endeavors the Chapter has recently embarked upon.

<u>Note:</u> These items can be purchased only by PLSO members, must be picked up at Chapter meetings only, and have to be ordered in advance.

Let's talk some history. The first recorded labor dispute in the Connecticut Western Reserve came in 1796 during the first surveying expedition by Moses Cleaveland and his cohorts. But first, a little history of that history.

Cleaveland and his two principal assistants, surveyor Augustus Porter and astronomer/surveyor Seth Pease hired on a crew for a two year period. No one anticipated the heavy woods or the harsh working conditions they would encounter. The crews were split up to perform several tasks at one time. One of the crews, Porters, was pulled off the job of running township lines to survey the actual location of the south shore of Lake Erie. The remaining crew was expected to continue and complete the survey of the township lines east of the Cuyahoga River. This just added a lot more work to the township crew.

Lack of food and supplies and a combination of malaria and dysentery took its toll. This combined with low wages for the services being performed and the added work contributed to the general dissatisfaction among the survey parties. When the two crews got together, there was a great deal of talk and griping. Nearly all the township crew and some of the shoreline crew decided to lodge a protest. Amzi Atwater, of whom I wrote two years ago, called the protest a "mutiny."

Moses Cleaveland was a good negotiator. He wanted to get back to the work at hand and complete as much of the survey as possible before the winter set in. He offered the survey parties extremely good terms for purchasing a township. We do not know who chose Township 8, Range 11, but this is the one decided upon. It happens to be the largest township in the Western Reserve and one of the most valuable. It contains almost 36 square miles as opposed to the normal 25 square miles, had Lake Erie frontage and good streams and drainage. It was high enough above the lake to be out of the swamp lands.

Cleaveland set the price of the land within the township at \$1.00 per acre, payable by the end of 1799. Other caveats were that by end of 1799, the purchaser had to build a log or frame dwelling and clear eight acres of his own land and plant it with wheat. There were other requirements that will not be discussed in this column. An agreement was reached and the crews went back to work. The survey crews named this township in honor of the father of geometry, Euclid.

It is hard to divide anything into 41 relatively equal portions, but the survey parties tried. First to be set aside were the "Lake" lots, 41 lots along the Lake Erie shore, set roughly perpendicular to the shore line, each containing about 84 acres. Then the "gore", an area south of the "Lake" lots with the northerly line a diagonal line roughly paralleling the shore line and an approximate east-west line. This contained, again, 41 lots each of about 148 acres. South of the "gore" was the "square", an approximate 4 mile by 5 mile block containing about 40 standard lots.

This looked good on paper, but various survey errors, tough working conditions and poor equipment probably caused more problems than were solved. For a surveyor's township, it left much to be desired.

Call to order: 6:05 p.m.

Upon completion of a roll call, determination of a quorum, acceptance of the January minutes and Treasurers report the meeting turned to unfinished business.

- 4.1 The Executive Director situation: we are still following through on requests from the Ohio Civil Rights Commission.
- 4.7 Website Upgrade: work has started and a prototype site should be ready for testing within two weeks. We have no insurance issues but should consult with our attorney concerning the acceptance of rules and regulations for use.

- 5.1 Acceptance of new members, (an incomplete list was included in the agenda package) Amy Kelly was a reinstatement for the Cleveland Chapter.
- 5.2 Crime: Brad Kramer passed along information sent to him about survey crews are now being treated as easy targets. Unfortunately it is becoming common knowledge that they are usually alone and have expensive equipment. Making a proactive move, one company is now authorizing at least one member of each crew to train for a concealed carry permit. It's something to think about. Already, some firms around the country are having problems retaining complete insurance on their equipment.

6.3 State Board of Registration: Beginning January 2009 the Board will begin using the revised course worksheet proposed by PLSO for applicants for licensure under section 4733.11 (B)(2)(a).

In the last couple of issues, I've mentioned the archive of early Chapter letters and newsletters donated by John Dailey. Here is a portion of one of the most important passages I've read from them.

From "Backsights and Foresights", May 1974 (prelude to the Chapter newsletter):

No longer will we harbor men who are "between jobs" or "unable to find other employment." We will be selective in choosing men who would make surveying their career, jealously guarding against those who would demean the profession. Those who are selected will be expected to enhance their abilities through

experience and by availing themselves of the educational programs we provide, for which they will be compensated in a manner that will enable them to be proud of their endeavors and not "second class citizens."

Proprietors will no longer be forced to comprise their standards for the sake of expedience. Quality and service will be their selling points with experienced, concerned personnel available to provide them. In engineering oriented firms the surveying portion will at least be self supporting. Remember, profit is <u>not</u> a dirty word in the surveying profession!

Recalling the motivation for this chapter's existence and the response we've had to date, our motto should be - "United we stand, divided we perish."

That passage still holds true in today's business environment. It is very easy to correlate the above passage with the creation of the Chapter's 2-year Survey School; however, the diminishing support for our Survey School shows a divergence of surveying companies and one of the principles PLSO was founded upon: advancement of the surveying profession. I have worked in recent years with field crew chiefs that did not know the fundamentals of plane geometry and whom could not perform surveying calculations without data collector routines. When a crew chief calls the office twice within a week asking what 4 5/8 inches is in decimals, you know surveying education has taken a back seat to field production.

- - Cuyahoga County GIS Hard Drive Update

Carefully review the computer software you have and ask the Cuyahoga County Engineer's Office questions about the data format of the information on their GIS hard drive. Reports are circulating that hard drives are being returned to the Engineer because users cannot access the data with their current software. (See county hard drive order form in the March issue on Page 21 http://www.plso.com/pdf/CSN_March_08.pdf)

It might we worth asking the Engineer's office if they will upload their data onto an external hard drive you provide to them since 500GB external hard drives are often found for less than \$200. Also other counties accept user external hard drives for uploading their GIS data and for a much lower fee than the \$150 Cuyahoga County charges.
