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

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

PRESIDENTS LETTER

Trends in 2018.

As we are now just midway in this month of March 2018, I'm seeing a new trend/ theme... February & March is the new May! What does that mean?

It means that even though snow and winter is still here in Northeast OHIO, clients are being aggressive in 2018 right away.

From all of my conversations with our members, other survey managers, and business owners – their workloads are robust and clients are requesting fast turnarounds.

Survey companies have told me their workloads are strong, slots are booking fast, and people are bidding the work for what they are worth.

Question: Is this all due to a strong economy, high stock market, low interest rates, a new White House, or overall perception of prosperity?

You all can debate this amongst yourselves. This leads me to my next topic...:

Manpower:

As everyone's workloads increase, the need for manpower and new employees has grown.

Being a part-time instructor at the University of Akron, I get approached constantly from members and nonmembers looking for surveyor help.

And one of my goals within my classroom is to make sure all of my students get placed in the career field by end of the semester.

Well this year, in March – all but 2 students (from Wooster area) out of 18 are either signed up already for internships, or are working for family members whom are surveys.

Our profession has a manpower problem, we know the following....

Average age of a Surveyor is 58 - Many surveyors are retiring – and colleges and universities have only limited amount of students enrolled for Surveying and Mapping.

So what as a profession are we to do? Well, the plan being implemented now is NOT working.

My suggestions are as such..

1. Engage the public – talk to them while working and explain the profession. Sell the Sell of what we do.

2. Look around – some answers are right in front of you.

Talk to the people at your church, your friends, acquaintances, other parents at soccer games, or a the outdoors store you frequent.

Take that person out with you on a job, let them shadow, run the prism pole, use a schonstedt, use your GPS with you, traipse thru the woods for property pins, buy them lunch.

Sometimes the exposure to surveying is all they need.

3. Talk to military recruiters – bring on a vet.

4. Take on a young Civil engineer or high school drafter as an intern. (aka allow them to grew from within your ranks).

Succession plan:

With the surveyors age being 58+..... What is your succession plan?

Hand over to another surveyor family member, sell to current employees, be bought out by a larger firm, sell your business outright to a young surveyor, or let your survey companies legacy just close shop or fade out/ disappear?

These are discussions I have heard in the past few years and many people are concerned about this.

Myself being 44 this year, I'm well under the average age. I am though, considered OLD to my students but YOUNG in the professions eyes and this is not a topic I have even thought about.

But, with not finding new people to take over the reigns, you will have less options when it's time to retire.

I feel the profession, (aka us as members), need to look beyond the project in front of us and plan for future months and years to come.

Look out to find that future surveyor, find that next generation that can handle the new tech., and will enjoy all of what we enjoy of the career.

If we keep only looking at our backsight, we can never move on to the next foresight!

So, take a sideshot and look for that new person to introduce into the profession.

Members Moments

Spring Fever.

With spring being here, all it takes is one 70 degree day for the phones to start ringing for those spring and summer projects. With that in mind, it's time to remind employees, and ourselves, of standards and safety, especially during these times of increased stress on productivity and timelines.

Take the time to reiterate safety with your crews and inspectors, emphasize the critical standards involved to insure you go home every night to your family. I fear the day that cones, safety lights and signs don't do their job as a texting driver is just simply focused on what is more important to them.

I'm not sure what the solution will be, nor do I see the focus being more on safety while texting and driving that than what the next iPhone will be. Take a look around you at the next stop light and tell me what you see. How many heads turning to glance at their phones, send a text, read a message? I know I do it. What will be distraction that takes away the effectiveness of your safety equipment? It is up to us to control what we can to maintain safety when working along roadways or in them. The other factors, I'm not sure if there is a good solution to them.

There have been several times when I have pulled off the road to tell surveyors to put on safety equipment. It was only a few weeks ago when I stopped to eat lunch in one of our local suburbs and watched a 2-man field crew work in and out of traffic on a major road, each with a GPS rover wearing nothing but old, dirty green t-shirts. There was no safety equipment in sight. It's hard to watch for traffic as we enter topo codes as fast as we can. It's a heavy decision to place timeliness and efficiency over safety. It's one I am faced with every day. Is it worth putting out the signs for just a couple of shots? Is it just unsafe for a one-man crew to operate the way I do? The advancement of instrument technology has increased productivity and at the same time eliminated the ability for a crew to watch each other's back.

All aspects of surveying grow with experience, the same goes for safety. With age comes the ability to recognize unsafe situations and environments. Construction sites have moving equipment, open trenches, etc. It is imperative that your crew chief initiate both new employees and experienced field crew with the standards in which you expect them to operate within, not only to protect them, but yourself as well. Do you trust your crew chief to convey this message? Or do you have a written safety manual for all to work within? Having these things in a written format may help what at first is an overwhelming task more manageable. A manual listing confined space restrictions and procedures for opening manholes, emergency procedures, and a list of local hospitals should all be in the van next to the first aid kit.

My message here is simple, spend the time to talk to your field crews, emphasize that safety is a concern for you and it must be for them as well. When going over a new job with crew members, discussing potential safety concerns can alleviate problems. I know, as a male dominated profession, the macho "we don't need a safety vest for this" is a common attitude that has a tendency to trickle down from the top. There is always work that needs to be done, do it proudly and safely.

5.3 William Edwards was appointed to the Scholarship Fund Board (term 2018-2023)


5.4 Ohio Standard Base Line. This base line was built in 1965-1966 by OSU and the Finnish Geodetic Institute. This baseline has not been used or maintained in years and have fallen into disrepair. There are four remaining monuments, three of which are within the an area of a proposed new roadway into OSU Mansfield Campus. The remaining monument will be restored and designated as a Historic Monument.


The national student competition that the University of Akron competes in and have won on numerous occasions was renamed in honor of Mike and Ann Besch.

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Akron University Happenings

Five University of Akron students competed in the NSPS Surveying Student Competition held in Las Vegas. It was designed as a "Service Learning" project as you might encounter in traveling to a third world location to help install a water system or build a bridge. The event took place from Feb. 17-21 at a field site 12 miles southwest of town on public lands and at the Luxor Hotel. The students established the boundary of a 1-acre square and performed a topographic survey of the desert site. Some big challenges came from the 40 mph winds that tried to keep the surveyors and their equipment off balance, plus the fact that only a hand compass, tapes, and a level could be used for the survey. That also meant old-fashioned field notes were recorded. At the hotel, students computed all of their field data and prepared a detailed topographic map with contours. On the third day they formally presented their results to the audience of NSPS judges, students from the 12 schools represented, faculty, and NSPS members. Although we did not win the competition this year, it was a great learning experience. As a bonus surprise, the 1st place trophy was officially named and engraved as the "Mike and Ann Besch Award." Thank you to PLSO chapters and members who provided support for the competition.
